



Message from our **Chair** and Managing Director

On behalf of the Board we present to you the Lions Eye Institute's 2022 Annual Report.

2022 was a year of inspiration and achievement for the Lions Eye Institute, with a number of key projects reaching significant milestones.

Through collaborations with The University of Western Australia (UWA) and Curtin University, we significantly increased our research capacity in clinical vision sciences and data science and analytics. Professor Allison McKendrick was appointed as the inaugural Lions Eye Institute **UWA Chair in Optometry** Research, and Professor Andrew Turpin accepted the role of inaugural Lions Curtin Chair in Ophthalmic Big Data. Both researchers moved to Perth from Melbourne in the latter half of the year.

In an exciting development, we opened a new state-of-the-art clinic in Midland in the second half of the year. The purposebuilt facility offers residents in Perth's eastern suburbs and surrounding regions a wide range of specialist eye care that was previously only available in the city and western suburbs.

We welcomed a new ophthalmologist, Dr Evan Wong. Dr Wong specialises in the management of corneal

disease including cataract and pterygium. He also specialises in refractive surgery and is actively involved in clinical research at the Institute.

JoAnne Forrest joined the Institute as Director Clinical Research, with a remit to build greater capacity within our clinical trials centre, as well as develop our immediate and long term vision for clinical research activities. The clinical trials team currently supports around 80 clinical trials each year.

We were grateful to receive more than \$1.5 million from **Channel 7 Telethon Trust to** support our medical research in inherited retinal diseases, myopia and paediatric community outreach. Thanks to Telethon and the generosity of the Western Australian community, our researchers will continue their dedication to improving the quality of life of children throughout the state.

We were successful in obtaining a substantial grant from the

State Government's inaugural Innovation Seed Fund to support the development of a portable hand-held device for non-invasive measurement of intracranial pressure (ICP) via the eye. This innovation will be a game-changer for ICP measurement, which typically is carried out through invasive techniques such as lumbar punctures or holes drilled into the skull.

The Lions Outback Vision Kimberley Eye Hub was officially opened in Broome, in a ceremony that celebrated the immense progress being made in treating eye disease in the Kimberley and Pilbara regions. The Hub is providing greater equity of eye health services and transforming patient care in remote, regional and vulnerable Aboriginal communities across the North West.

The **Doctor of Optometry** program at UWA continues to gain momentum, with the inaugural students now in their second year, and a strong cohort



kicking off their studies in 2022. The course will support the development of high-calibre optometrists with a focus on early detection, diagnosis and treatment of eye disease. The program also includes a comprehensive research curriculum.

We continue to manage the risks associated with COVID-19. Early in 2022, and in line with government direction, we made the difficult decision in early 2022 to postpone non-urgent surgeries for a brief period. Urgent surgery was able to go ahead with enhanced safety protocols. The pandemic also impacted on availability of staff, in particular in our clinics, and led to the temporary suspension of our volunteer program.

However, our enhanced focus on the safety and wellbeing of patients and staff during 2020 and 2021 enabled minimal overall disruption to services.

Thank you to our Board of **Directors and Executive team** for continuing to provide strong direction and leadership during a year of uncertainty. In particular, we would like to express our gratitude to Rudolf Brunovs who served on the Board of the Lions Eye Institute from 2005 until July 2022. We are immensely grateful for his contributions over the last 17 years.

We also thank our staff for their unwavering dedication and loyalty during this extraordinary year. Your commitment to our mission has been truly inspiring,

and we couldn't have made it through without each and every one of you.

Thank you also to our supporters. Without you, we would be unable to continue providing world-class care and treatment to our patients, or discover the next sight saving medical research breakthroughs.

Year in **review**

JANUARY

A sign of the times. We introduced a number of safety measures to protect patients and staff in our clinics, including mandatory face masks. Our clinic volunteer program was temporarily suspended.

42 inaugural **Doctor of Optometry students** (pictured right) commenced their second year of the new program at UWA, and 58 students entered into their first year.

Lions Outback Vision welcomed new optometrist Raj Prasad and doctors Dr James Wiffen, Dr Joshua Taylor, Dr Shilpa Kulkarni, Dr Amy Kalantary and Dr Sae Cho.





FEBRUARY

Associate Professor Fred Chen was invited by the United States Army to contribute towards a study looking at the long-term safety of using tafenoquine, an anti-malarial medication. Dr Chen's involvement included eye examination for corneal and retinal changes.

Research co-authored by **Dr Samantha Lee** found more than a third of young adults may experience a myopic shift in at least one eye after the age of 20 - suggesting regular eye checks are vital in your 20s. It was previously thought that myopia stabilises in children by their mid-teens.

We celebrated International Women in Science Day by showcasing our incredibly talented female ophthalmologists and researchers (some of whom are pictured above) and what they enjoy the most about working in the field of medicine and medical research.

MARCH

COVID-19 caused some disruption to clinic services in Perth. We are grateful to patients and staff for your flexibility and understanding during this time.

As case numbers increased and regional communities closed to protect their residents, the Lions Outback Vision team worked quickly to reorganise the Vision Van (pictured below) schedule in order to accommodate as many patients as possible. For some people living in the regions, the Vision Van is their only opportunity to access eye health care.




APRIL

Lions Eye Bank of WA celebrated the first ever Eye and Tissue Awareness Week. Eye tissue donation can restore sight, prevent blindness, and dramatically change an individual's quality of life. Donor tissue is also crucial to advancing medical research.

We were grateful to Channel 7 Telethon Trust for naming the Lions Eye Institute as one of 97 beneficiaries of Telethon 2021, with funds used to purchase a stem cell robot, commence a paediatric ophthalmology service in the North West, and instigate several medical research projects targeting childhood blindness.

The Lions Eye Institute and UWA announced the appointment of Professor Allison McKendrick (pictured below), a world leader in clinical vision sciences, as the inaugural Lions Eye Institute UWA Chair in Optometry Research.





MAY

Yvonne (pictured above), a proud Yawuru woman, bravely shared her story of losing her sight to cataracts and swelling inside her eyes from diabetes. Thankfully, Yvonne was able to access sight saving eye health care with Lions Outback Vision and is now able to look after her grandchildren, enjoy gardening and re-enter the workforce.

We celebrated International Clinical **Trials Day** and the incredible work of the multidisciplinary clinical trials team who support around 80 clinical trials each year at the Lions Eye Institute.

JUNE

A national team of researchers including Professor David Mackey AO (pictured right) uncovered hidden genetic markers for glaucoma, the world's leading cause of permanent blindness, opening the door to new treatment options.

We published our inaugural Impact Report, highlighting the direct impact philanthropic support has made on not only the Lions Eye Institute, but on the Western Australian community, nationally and in the Asia-Pacific region.

Professor Graham Barrett was awarded a Member (AM) in the General Division of the Order of Australia for significant service to ophthalmology.



JULY

We were proud to receive State Government Innovation Seed Funding to progress the development of OcuLinx™, a portable hand-held device for non-invasive measurement of intracranial pressure via the eye. The research behind the device was pioneered by Professor Bill Morgan, Professor Dao-Yi Yu and the Physiology and Pharmacology research team.

Alongside Curtin University and the Lions Save-Sight Foundation (WA) Inc, we announced the appointment of Professor Andrew Turpin (pictured right) to the inaugural Lions Curtin Chair in Ophthalmic Big Data.

We celebrated **NAIDOC Week** with a special morning tea where staff sampled a variety of delicious native inspired delicacies from Gather Foods, a majority Aboriginal-owned and led catering company.





AUGUST

We officially opened a brand new clinic in Midland, with four leading ophthalmologists covering the full spectrum of eye diseases for residents of Perth's eastern suburbs and surrounding areas.

A new Nikon AX-R confocal microscope arrived at our research laboratory thanks to generous support from Telethon and The Ian Potter Foundation. The new microscope will assist **Dr** Livia Carvalho (pictured above) and her team to expedite the process of developing new personalised therapies for Western Australian children with inherited retinal diseases.

Professor Bill Morgan returned to Indonesia for the first time in two years to teach registrars and consultants how to monitor progression in glaucoma, continuing the Lions Eye Institute's long-standing commitment to improving eye health care in the region.

SEPTEMBER

Led by Dr Samuel McLenachan, researchers at the Lions Eye Institute, Ear Science Institute Australia, UWA, Curtin and Murdoch Universities joined forces to tackle Usher syndrome, the most common form of inherited deaf-blindness, thanks to a prestigious Medical Research Future Fund grant.

With support from Telethon, Perpetual, the Stan Perron Charitable Foundation and other valued supporters, Brian King Fellow Dr Jessica Mountford and Dr Antony Clark continued world-first medical research into genetic and environmental risk factors for childhood myopia, a disease of growing global concern.

An incredible milestone! Three staff, including Janine (pictured below), celebrated 25 years of service at the Lions Eye Institute. All are extremely valued members of our team.





OCTOBER

Dr Evan Wong joined the Lions Eye Institute Nedlands clinic, specialising in corneal, cataract and refractive surgery.

We were thrilled to be part of the 2022 Telethon Family Festival, held at the new home of Telethon, RAC Arena.

Professor Graham Barrett AM was invited to deliver the prestigious Barraquer Lecture at the 2022 American Academy of Ophthalmology meeting in Chicago USA.

Professor Thomas Gardner (pictured above) joined us from the US to deliver the 23rd annual Ian Constable Lecture, exploring the way we name, treat and manage disease.

The **Kimberley Eye Hub** (pictured below) was officially opened in Broome by Senator Patrick Dodson and Ms Divina D'Anna MLA with the Hon Linda Reynolds and many distinguished guests in attendance. The Hub is a game-changer for eye health services delivery in Australia's North West.



NOVEMBER

New research co-authored by Associate **Professor Angus Turner** demonstrated for the first time that Indigenous people are affected more by the blinding ocular effects of diabetes than non-Indigenous populations.

With travel restrictions lifted, a number of our leading medical researchers and ophthalmologists attended the 2022 **RANZCO Annual Scientific Congress** in Queensland. As experts in their fields, they shared their knowledge on topics ranging from cataract to uveitis and everything in between.



DECEMBER

In line with lessening restrictions, we were delighted to remove entry screening requirements from our clinics, and prepare to recommence our clinic volunteer program in early 2023.

We introduced you to Kate (pictured above), a 15-year-old from Perth, Western Australia who was born with cataracts, and lives with childhood glaucoma. Kate has been a patient at the Lions Eye Institute since she was just three years old. Philanthropic support has allowed our researchers to provide Kate with the latest possible treatments available and save her sight.




Financial report

The Lions Eye Institute was not immune to the tough global market conditions felt during the 2022 year and our final deficit result of \$4.7 million was largely driven by a \$4.4 million unrealised loss within our investment portfolio.

Income

Commercial income continues to be the Lions Eye Institute's major source of funding, contributing \$21.09 million in 2022. The remainder was sourced through grants, contracts, philanthropy and investment returns.






Expenditure


